This book looks into the Pacific Island voyages of two British explorers and their observations and interpretations of the Pacific societies and cultures they encountered. More specifically the book has attempted to reveal the similarities and divergences between these two British explorers and their respective interpretations of Pacific natives. Furthermore, the backdrop of Enlightenment thought is used to elucidate a better understanding of the encounters of the two very different societies of Western Europe and the Pacific world during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.
