The Influence of Language on Attitudes and Biases in English and Spanish

**CURRENT RESEARCH INTERESTS:**

Zeno Vendler (1967). *Linguistics in Philosophy*. Ithaca, NY: Cornell University Press.

Vendler asserts that languages have a number of event types that can be put into a typology. I would like to analyze Korean for whether event types adhere to Vendler's analysis of event types described from English. This might reveal whether Vendler's event types are universal among all languages.

Abney, S. (1987). *The English Noun Phrase in its Sentential Aspect*. PhD dissertation, MIT.

Abney claims that languages have a functional phrase (i.e., determiner phrase) as a maximal projection above a lexical phrase (i.e., noun phrase). Abney asserts that the noun phrase mirrors verb phrases in that both must have functional phrases to act as the mortar between lexical words phrases in a sentence. This is controversial because linguistics traditionally has treated the noun phrase as the only maximal projection; thus determiner phrases have traditionally been treated as minimal projections or, even further, on par with extended projections. I would like to find whether Abney's DP Hypothesis fits Korean.

Fukui, N. (1986). *A Theory of Category Projection and its Applications*. PhD dissertation, MIT. Revised version (1995) as *Theory of Projection in Syntax*. Stanford: CSLI Publications and Cambridge University Press.

Fukui suggests possible ways to supporting Abney's hypothesis, but Fukui asserts that not all languages have functional phrases. Fukui analyzes functional phrases for features that distinguish them from lexical phrases. I hope to apply Fukui's method to find whether Korean has inverse or covert functional phrases.
